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Another way in which parents may assist teachers and have much expense to themselves is by sending their children to school constantly. One of the principal advantages of schools, is that of class-education by which much labor is saved. But when pupils are chased together, it is very important that they advance equally. This cannot be, unless each attends constantly. The omission of a single lesson often throws a pupil so far behind in this class, that he will remain in the rear for a month, and perhaps the whole way through the course. Especially is this the case when some important explanation has been given or experiment performed in the pupils absence. The effect of irregularity in attendance is to increase the difficulties in the way of their improvement, to discourage them, and to make them less susceptible to instruction. Pupils in health should not be permitted to be absent from a single recitation, but from the most urgent necessity, and in such cases, if at all practicable, they should be required to get at once the lessons which have been recited by the regular in their absence. When pupils attend regularly to their studies, they go on easily and cheerfully; but when this is not the case, they find their lessons difficult, and frequently losing the
